We were introduced onto the House floor by Representative Janet Buckner, who has been a champion for our organization and all educators for years! We were able to talk with many legislators who represent the districts that we live and teach in. We had one-on-one meetings with Janet Buckner and Lang Sias, who have both expressed interest in working with our organization after this session is over.



The biggest "win" for our this organization vear was that SHAPE Colorado's Advocacy Committee received invitation from Senator Owen Hill (Chairman of the Senate Education Committee) to the present to



Senate Educate Committee on physical education. The advocacy committee did an amazing job representing both physical education and health during this presentation and set the precedence for the committee to consider the importance of quality physical education and health in students' K-12





education while they are currently looking at reevaluating the school finance formula for Colorado. Kayla Tibbles, SHAPE Colorado's lobbyist, mentioned that the presentation was a huge success, as legislators came up to her after the presentation and weeks after talking about the positive impact it had on their thoughts and conversations as they move forward in discussion about education in Colorado.

We are looking forward to following up with our contacts in May after session is out. In the

meantime, please consider reaching out to your representatives in your districts and INVITE them into your classrooms! When legislators are able to see quality physical education and health classes, they are able to replace their experiences of climbing the rope and dodgeball with great examples of integrated, developmentally appropriate classes. accomplishments of moving organization forward. Following is an update of what has been happening on each of your SHAPE Colorado committees.

**Professional** Development The **Committee:** professional development committee hosted two "BUST OPEN Your Physical Education Program" in partnership with University of Northern Colorado, University of Colorado at Pueblo and OPEN US Games. There are three additional professional development opportunities to be offered this spring. Denver Summer Institute at Metro State Campus and "Bust OPEN Your Physical Education Program" in Fort Morgan and again in Jeffco. Look for registration notifications on Bust OPEN Your Physical Education Program soon.

Convention/Recognition: The Convention committee along with Shannon Milliken and Terry Jones were able to secure outstanding presenters

for our 2018 Fall Convention. In addition, the Convention/Recognition committee worked on solidifying our upcoming convention sites. They worked on finding a convention site that could accommodate our growing membership while keeping convention affordable. We are excited to be at the Radisson in Aurora for October 2018 and then will be moving to the Hyatt across from Anschutz Medical Center 2019-2021.

**Advocacy Committee**: The advocacy committee recently hosted SHAPE Colorado Lobby Day where health and physical education teachers gathered at the Colorado State Capitol. We were able to have conversations with key legislators promoting the importance of health and physical education. In addition, the advocacy committee presented before the Senate Education Committee, emphasizing the need for funding support to health and physical education. Shannon Milliken and Karen Marley did an outstanding job representing SHAPE Colorado before the Senate Education Committee laying groundwork for future support and funding.

The Colorado Physical Education and

Comprehensive Health standards review and revision is nearing its completion. I would like to thank all of the SHAPE Colorado members that have put countless hours into Both committees process. started the review and revision process in May of 2017 and met face to face 5 times in the past year with additional conference calls between meetings.

The committees started by reviewing the current Colorado standards to determining their current alignment with national standards and national exemplars. They also spent a large

amount of time reviewing public feedback and recommendations for revision. Overall, the revisions that are being suggested to the standards both health and physical education will align the skills and knowledge so students can transition from elementary through school in а consistent and meaningful way. The revised standards have the potential to develop physically literate students to be lifelong movers.

The proposed standards will be presented to the State Board of Education in May of 2018 with the possible adoption in June of 2018. The proposed revised standards are currently the on Colorado Department of Education website. http://www.cde.state.co.us/

### SPEAK OUT DAY 2018

On Wednesday, February 14, Clayton Ellis, Karen Marley, Shannon Milliken, and Debbie Luithly represented

Colorado for SHAPE America's SPEAK Out Day in Washington D.C. We met with interns from Senator Michael Bennet, Senator Cory Gardner, Representative Jared Polis, Representative Mike Coffman, Representative Doug Lamborn, Representative Diane DeGette, Representative Ken Buck, and Representative Ed Perlmutter.

We asked our legislators for their support in funding Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA) Title IV, Part A and ESSA Title II, Part A. ESSA Title IV, Part funds a well-rounded education and safe and healthy students. It was originally authorized funding for \$1.65B. Last year it received \$400M for all states and school districts. ESSA Title II, Part A funding is used to retain effective teachers and provide access to

effective teachers for low income and minority students. It would help fund professional development for all school

employees. Physical Education and Health are considered core subjects under ESSA. ESSA was developed with the whole child in mind.

You do not need to go to Washington D.C. to advocate for Health and Physical Education. New this year is <a href="SHAPE Colorado's Legislative Action Center">SHAPE Colorado's Legislative Action Center</a>. You can go to the action center and send a form letter to your legislators regarding ESSA Title IV, Part A and ESSA Title II, Part A. To access the forms, you will click "Take Action" under SHAPE America. ESSA Title IV, Part A and ESSA Title II, Part A are separate and have their own link. It will take you to SHAPE America to finish filling out your information. You will need to put in your contact information and it will pull up your legislator and let you preview and




print the form before you send it. You may, also, create your own message to send.

It is important that each one of us take part in advocating for our profession, whether by attending an advocacy event, talking to local administrators about the importance of Health and Physical Education, or sending letters to our legislators. Do your part to advocate for our great field.

Our first session was hosted in the southern region at CSU Pueblo. We had over 50 SHAPECO members attend and learn new ways to immediately use this curricular resource in the classroom! ### BALANCING AND BENDING BODIES: GYMNASTICS





<u>Blog Posts</u>: These are articles written by practicing PE and health teachers reflecting on their practices




### ThePhysicalEducator

SHAPE America Exchange: This is an online forum with conversations ranging from how to utilize best practices in classroom management to how to teach a skateboarding unit.


<u>SHAPE America webinars</u>: These are online classes you can watch from the comfort of your home. Many of these classes offer credit.

### WALKING OUT IN PROTEST

"Ms. Graves, what would you do if I walked out right now in protest...?"

On February 14, 2018 a young man walked into his school in Florida and opened fire, killing 14 students and 3 adults. However, this is not the first time someone has entered a school and used violence as an outlet which took the lives of innocent students and adults. In 1999, on April 20th, Colorado experienced the first of too many major mass school shooting at Columbine High School. The fear of similar events is too often in the minds citizens of all ages. This was the beginning of mass school shootings throughout the United States.

At 10:00AM on March 14, there were planned walkouts to demonstrate a stand against violence in schools. Prior to 10 a.m. one of my students asked, "Ms. Graves, what would you do if I walked out right now in protest of school violence?" In this moment, a million thoughts ran through my head, but I responded with "Well, what are you going to do after you walk out of here?" I soon realized that my students wanted to walk out but didn't feel supported in protesting. After reflecting on this experience, I began to think of alternative scenarios to a walk-out for my students to express their civil rights without getting backlash from administration

or parents as well as not disrupting the precious time we get together in a day. Here we are trying to teach middle school students to be young adults but is a walk-out really the best way for them to express freedom of speech in a constructive way that will get their voices heard.

I talked to other teachers, our school resource officer, and turned to social media to see what other creative ways teachers were helping their students reflect on what happened one month ago and safely express their civil rights. One school had a school wide moment of silence, while another sent out staff to stand with students in the field for 17 minutes in honor of the 17 lost lives. Then I came across a "Walk-Up" instead of a walk out. Students were given 17 sticky notes and asked to write notes to 14 students and 3 adults that would help them smile that day. In the end, the hallways were covered in bright colored sticky notes that intended to make a positive impact in their school. Another possibility is having students write their local legislators to advocate for their beliefs and opinions.

It can be tough to establish positive ground when it comes to a walk out, but with a little creativity, you can help your students express their opinions and beliefs in a positive manner. Ghandi said "Be the change you wish to see in the world". Empowering our students to stand up for what they believe in a successful manner can be challenging, however, if we think outside the box we can encourage students to be the change they wish to see.

### FISHING IN SCHOOLS

The National Fishing in Schools Program ("Fishing in Schools") is a nationwide program providing an inschool curriculum for PE teachers that enables them to teach their students the skill of fishing. An all-inclusive program, NFSP provides the training/certification, curriculum and equipment necessary to educate elementary through high school students about the lifetime outdoor sport of angling.

NFSP is currently installed in some 38 schools/institutions in Colorado. Overall, 200 schools in 28 states participate. Until now, the curriculum, called "Cast A Fly, Catch A Student" has been providing instruction in fly fishing. The sequel, "Cast A Lure, Catch A Student" will use spincasting equipment. It will be available in the fall of 2018.
